I: This is Debbie Anderson; and I'm talking to Mrs. A.E. Anderson at 23 South Pleasnt in Princeton, Illinois. Mrs. Anderson, what was it really like when you came over here?

N: Well, there were no sidewalks-mostly wooden sidewalks and Main Street was not paved and there was hitching posts all over- all along the street.

I: When you came over, were did you do farming, or were you in a businesstype, or--

N: No, I worked in the housework.

I: Housework?

N: Uh huh.

I: Did your husband- was he a farmer?

N: Yes, he was a farmer.

I: What kind of farming machinery did they have?

N: They had binders, and horses to pull their plows.

I: What- what year did you come over here?

N: Nineteen-four the fourth of September.

I: How old were you when you came over?

N: Fourteen.

I: Fourteen?

N: Fourteen years.

I: When you came over, did you come directly to Princeton, and if you did, what was Princeton like then?

N: Well...you want to say the same thing over again?

- I: Alright. Did you come directly to Princeton..?
- N: You had to go the Chicago down to Princeton -- of course, we had to go through New York to Princeton.

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- I: What kind of transportation did youcome on?
- N: Train.
- I; What kind of transportation did they have around this area?
- N: Horses and wagons...and buggies.
- I: Did you see the streetcar?
- N: Yeah, the streetcar from Bureau to Princeton.
- I: How far did that streetcar go?
- N: Down to the north end and back to Bureau.
- I: What kind of businesses did they have around Princeton?
- N: Well, they had, they had stores like ____ and Peterson's—dry goods stores. They had a library up at the south end; they didn't have a lot of ____ you settled on the east side of Princeton. And they had horses and buggies and wagons, farm wagons and of course they had surreys with the fringe on top(laughs).
- I: When the high school was burning did you see a lot of it..?
- N: Well, I could see it from here, yes. I lived here then.
- N: _____ on south Main street across from the Christian church and my worked there.
- I: Oh, What kind of grocery stores did they have? Were they like modern styles or..
- N; No, they were no modern, they were just common markets, and they had everything ______ because you could buy things more reasonable in those days.
- I: Was theirkfood expensive?

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N: No it wasn't; it was just, uh nice really.

- I: Was the town big, or little or..
- N: It was smaller than it is now.
- I: A lot smaller?
- N: No, not lots smaller, not so many people.
- I: Did they have two separate business districts like they have now?
- N: Yes, north end and the south end.
- I: What kinds of tools and stuff like that did you use on the farm?
- N: Well in the house we had the old fashioned cook stove where it could burn wood or coal.
- I: What did you use around the kitchen, like to wash your elothes, or to..
- N: Washboard.
- I: What kind of pans and stuff?
- N: Well we had..
- I: Cast iron, or just..
- N: We had this enamelled cookware, youkknow like---we had iron frying pans and all kinds of things.
- I: What kind of transportation did you use to get from the farm to town and back?
- N: Horse and buggy until my hasband bought a carand we drove. The first car we had was a Rambler and they were—and that was a good one (laughs).
- In 1923.we quit farming and moved to town where my husband had an agency for the Rambler automobile.
- I: How long did he have that agency?
- N: For, uh, forty-eightyyears, I think it was. And my husband built the first car he drove in, the first car in Bureau county.
